Introduction

The Coon Creek Watershed District was created in 1959. The Watershed District Act (103D) and the Metropolitan Water Management Act (103B) provide the most basic authorities for the District. In 1990 the District Board adopted the following mission statement to guide District programs and activities.

The District is required to report annually on a variety of activities. These requirements and the laws that mandate the reporting are listed here.

The Minnesota Watershed Act (M.S. 103D.351) requires the District to prepare a yearly report of

- The financial conditions of the District
- The status of all projects
- The business transacted by the District
- Other matters affecting the interests of the District
- The District plans for the succeeding year

The Metropolitan Water Management Act (M.S. 103B.231) requires a yearly report similar to the Watershed Act but stipulates specific financial and activity items to be reported.

- Roster and contact information for the Board and Advisory Committees
- Various financial expenditure information
- Permit and enforcement activity
- Annual plan
- Status of local plan adoption
- Summary of monitoring data


Mission

The mission of the Coon Creek Watershed District is to manage groundwater and the surface water drainage system to prevent property damage, maintain hydrologic balance and protect water quality for the safety and enjoyment of citizens, and the preservation and enhancement of wildlife habitat.

Organizational Structure

A Board of Managers administers the Watershed District. The Board is composed of five members representing different geographic areas of the District. Each Manager serves a staggered three-year term and is nominated by his or her local unit of government and appointed by the Anoka County Board. The Board is statutorily authorized to employ professional assistants in carrying out its duties. The Board and staff provide leadership on a watershed-wide basis. Watershed-wide policy and direction are formulated and provided for field implementation through District and Municipal activities.

The mission of the District is accomplished in many ways through several different but cohesive organizational structures. On the watershed level, the District office and City engineering, public works and planning departments (through the Technical Advisory Committee) connect the Board to link the Board to field activities. Issues and larger public concerns and trends are reflected through the District's Citizen Advisory Committee and network. Research and development is performed in close coordination with the Anoka Conservation District and other Natural Resource based agencies.



District Business Model

As the lead agency in the watershed concerning water resource conservation and management, the Coon Creek Watershed District provides leadership in the protection, management and use of the water and related land resources. The District's approach to management integrates ecological, economic and social factors to maintain and enhance the quality of the watershed to meet current and future needs.

In support of its mission, the District business model has developed through strategic and comprehensive planning to provide better public service and sustainable land stewardship practices.


The Management Discussion and Analysis section presents financial statements and narrative descriptions to illustrate a cohesive and comprehensive picture of programs and financial performance.

Linkage to District Goals

The watershed uses a multiple-use land management approach to pursue eleven statutory goals. To implement its mission and pursue the legislative goals, the Coon Creek Watershed District operates six programs:

- 1. Administration
- 2. Development Regulations and Issue Management;
- 3. Planning, Programming and Budgeting;
- 4. Operations and Maintenance;
- 5. Research and Data Collection; and
- 6. Public and Governmental Relations.

Other Significant Events

Coon Creek Watershed District was one of the fastest growing areas in terms of population growth in the Twin Cities metropolitan area since the 2000 census through 2006. Since 2006, the pace of residential development has slowed and is attributable to regional and national economic factors. The District has taken a revised outlook on where growth is most likely to occur in contrast to previously determined urban services staging areas. In 2012, the District issued 40 permits compared to 19 permits the prior year.

Some additional noteworthy events/activities that occurred in 2012-13 and that influence the 2014 budget:

- 1) The ongoing escrow return program closed out 32 projects and returned \$111,477.
- Ditch repair projects were completed in Ham Lake on County Ditch 11 and the lower portion of County Ditch 44. The upper portion of County Ditch 44 was completed in 2013.
- 3) Xeon pond was constructed adjacent to Sand Creek on Xeon Bld to treat and regulate flow from a neighborhood in Coon Rapids which had no water quality treatment.
- 4) Nine rain gardens were constructed in Coon Rapids adjacent to Sand Creek between Foley Bld and Olive St. for \$69,662.

- 5) Three bank stabilization projects were constructed. Two on Coon Creek and one on Sand Creek.
- 6) The District completed its first inspection of drainage channel for the City of Blaine as part of a collaborative effort to keep costs down in administering the NPDES requirements that both agencies have.
- 7) The Board of Managers reaffirmed the District's commitment to collaborating with all units of government in managing water and related natural resources.
- 8) The District completed and submitted its Comprehensive Water Resource Management Plan, required by State Statute to the State of Minnesota for review and approval.
- 9) The Anoka County Geologic Atlas was completed as the first fully digital and GIS compatible Atlas's in the state and providing key information and insights into the geology and ground water within the watershed.
- 10) The District commenced the first phase of a Watershed Restoration Assessment and Plan (WRAP) through a grant from the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency.
- 11) The new General Permit for the NPDES program was approved by the MPCA and took affect August 1, 2013.
- 12) The District presented at the annual MAWD Conference in December on the use of GIS and animation for groundwater and bank stabilization education.
